OKC Buffalos Football

The Buffalos opened training camp on August 22nd in preparation for their first game on September 2nd. The team is made up of players from the three neighboring First Nations of Ochapowace, Kahkewistahaw and Cowessess. Besides being a high school team with players in grades 9-12, the Buffalos are also running a developmental squad for students in grades 7 and 8.



Football is new to many of the players on the team, but there is some good athleticism among the players. Several players came and went as they experimented with football, but the core of the team has stayed consistent.

The Buffalos had their first game on September 2nd, traveling to Southey to take on the Screaming Eagles. The Southey captains offered tobacco to the Buffalos captains before the game as a sign of respect. The game was lopsided, as the experienced Screaming Eagles defeated the Buffalos, but it was a great learning experience for our players.


talk to the students about the purposes and significance of the feast in Cree culture, and to instruct students on feast protocols.

Many ladies from the school and community prepared delicious soups, sandwiches and bannock, as well as fruit, berries, and other traditional food items. A group of CKCS high school boys worked hard in their roles as servers for the feast.

For added safety, the feast was held outside in the school's interior courtyard area. The wind sometimes made it challenging to keep track of Styrofoam plates and cups, but it

Traditional Uses of Plants

Students in the grade 5/6 class spent time learning about traditional plants that are used as food and medicine. The students picked plants, researched their uses, and then did group presentations to their classmates.



Teepee Set-Up

Mr. Terry learned his lesson, and now the teepee with Chief Kahkewistahaw's picture is in front of the school where it should be!



Grade 4 Learning

The grade 4 students participated in several lessons about residential schools. Miss Alana Taypotat read them a story, and explained the history of residential schools in Canada.

In science class, the students have been learning about different animals and the kinds of things they eat. They also worked on a poster to represent important and interesting things about themselves.





Life Transitions 20 Field Trip



The grade 11 Life Transitions class started the school year with a module on nutrition, and to supplement their learning, they did a field trip to Mr. Terry Bob's place to learn about traditional foods.

Mr. Terry taught the students about mint tea and sage, and also showed them some wild strawberries and crab apples.

High School Work Experience

In an effort to give our high school students meaningful ways of learning and working toward graduation, CKCS is offering a variety of work experience credit options.

This semester, several of our students will join the KFN Housing team on Fridays to help with a variety of projects in the community. Next semester, we are hoping to have students going to Melville on Fridays to get work experience at Kihew Fabco, and experiencing the variety of trades used in metal fabrication.

Again this year, we plan to offer the Construction 101 program in cooperation with Your Choice Homes. The project will focus on building a home in our community. One of our Construction 101 grads from 2021, Sterling Louison, has a job in Regina, using his skills with a company that does house exterior work: windows, doors and siding.
